The various infrastructural facilities in the campus include: Eight Teaching Blocks, Four Boys Hostels, Four Girls Hostels, One Working Women Hostel, University Central Library, Research Laboratories in each Department, University Computer and Informatics Centre, Administrative Block, University Health Centre, University Sports Grounds, Two Multipurpose Halls for Indoor Games, Guest House, Faculty House, Residences, University Cafeteria, Shopping Complex, Open Air Theatre, Post Office, Bank, Guru Jambheshwar Bhawan, Water Treatment Plant, Sewerage Treatment Plant, Animal House, Bio-Nanoo Technology Centre, Haryana School of Business, Central Instrumentation lab, Ch. Ranbir Singh Auditorium is the technical jewel of the University. The auditorium gigantic structure is capable of accommodating hundred to eighteen hundred persons at one go in its four state of the art seminar halls and theatre construction for convocations, conferences, seminars, workshops, concerts, ballets, film shows, plays, and other stage performances, etc. of national international level. Dr. Bhim Rao Ambedkar Library The University Library has a circular designed three-story building with a seating capacity of 400 seats. The Library runs in two shifts from 9.00 am to 7.00 pm and remains open on Saturday and Sunday also. The timings of Night Reading Hall are 8.00 am to 12.00 Midnight. However, during examination days, these remain open ROUND THE CLOCK. The Library has a collection of 106566 books and 5622 bound volumes of Journals. The Library has received 284 Indian Journals, 41 Magazines, and 20

Newspapers. The Library, in its electronic repository, has the access to 7500 ejournals of 19 publishers through UGC-INFONET Consortium under e-Shodhsindhu Project. Besides this, the Library has the perpetual access of SPSS and also subscribed Prowess, POP of IEEE. Also, NPTEL (National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning) Video Lectures are available on the Campus Wide Network. A DD Free Dish under SWAYAM PRABHA Programme initiated by the Government of India having 32 Educational Channels has been installed in the Video Conferencing Hall of the library. Further to cope up with the current information demands of the science users, the library has taken the lifetime Institutional membership of the Current Science Association. To access the existing databases and eresources, the Library has established two labs i.e. Research Database Lab for the Research Scholars Faculty Members and SC/ST students Lab with a state-ofthe-art facility. Besides, the University Library provides the facility to detect check plagiarism with Turnitin: An Anti-Plagiarism Software. Moreover, to provide the access of university these in public domain, the Library has signed the MoU with INFLIBNET(Information Library Network Centre), Gandhinagar for Shodhganga Repository and accordingly the soft copies of these are being sent to INFLIBNET as and when received in the Library for uploading into Shodhganga Repository. A total of 2555 research papers published by the faculty in peer-reviewed journals of national and international repute have been listed on Scopus with over 39120 citations. One Paper cited more than 1492 times, 55 papers cited more than 100 times and average paper citations 14.63. At present the h-Index of the University has also gone up to 79 from 17 in 2009-10. Eight departments of the university have been awarded the SAP-DRS projects by UGC while three departments have been awarded FIST grant from DST, Nano Mission Grant from DST, HRD and BIF grant DBT Govt. of India. The MHRD, Government of India and the UGC have approved the inclusion of this university in the Global Initiative of Academic Networks (GIAN Project) which is a prestigious and ambitious scheme for significantly uplifting the quality of teaching-learning processes in the institutions of Higher Education in India. The University has been sanctioned a grant of Rs.19.46 Crore for infrastructure development Rs.1.0 Crore for Human Resource Development Centre from Department of Higher Education, Ministry of Human Resource Development, Govt of India Under Rashtriya Uchchtar Shiksha Abhiyan (RUSA-I). DST, New Delhi has sanctioned a grant of Rs.10.25 crores under the PURSE program to the University.
